

September 2007 Psychology Newsletter

From the Chair:

The department continues to grow with 180 plus new first year psychology majors, two new assistant professors in Industrial Organizational Psychology, two new positions allocated from the Provost's office to the department, and two new positions in the Undergraduate Advising office. All of this growth is in order to better meet the needs of our students at the graduate and undergraduate levels. As you can see from this newsletter our faculty and students are active, very productive and involved in all elements of the academic endeavor and the department begins this academic year healthy and growing. Welcome to the new academic year.

Faculty and Department News:

The department welcomes two new faculty members to the Industrial Organizational program, Drs. Stefanie Johnson and Alyssa Gibbons. Dr. Gibbons recently graduate from the University of Illinois and Dr. Johnson previously held positions at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Colorado, Denver after receiving her degree from Rice University.

The department was able to successfully compete for funds from the University that allowed us to hire two additional undergraduate advisors/counselors. Becky Villalpando has been hired as a new member of the undergraduate academic advising staff, and joins D. Tobiassen Baitinger. Ms. Villalpando is an Academic Support Coordinator, a position funded by retention funds from the Provost's office. These are new funds to our department. The Academic Support Coordinator position is part of a pilot program with potential expansion campus-wide. The Academic Support Coordinator is a unique blend of advising, recruitment, retention, and assessment responsibilities that allows for a more holistic approach to working with students. We hope to hire a second Academic Support Coordinator to begin in November.

Some of the new initiatives being implemented by the advising center include:

- Meeting with all psychology majors who are on academic probation (less than 2.0 cumulative GPA) prior to registration for SP08 classes.
- Facilitating the PSY 192 first year seminar for 149 first year psychology students.
- Meeting individually with nearly 150 first year psychology students during the first 6 weeks of the fall semester.
- Completing 4-year plans with nearly 150 of our first year psychology students, promoting course completion.
- Partnering with the Center for Advising and Student Achievement to provide critical interventions with first year psychology students who indicate academic distress on their Taking Stock at mid-Semester inventory
- Moving the advising area to a mostly paperless system. This transition will allow us to complete remote advising in the future, including doing outreach advising in locations such as the Lory Student Center, Advocacy Offices or the Ingersoll Residential College.
- Supporting the development and implementation of a supplemental instruction program for MATH 117, 118, 124 to promote earlier and more successful completion of mathematics requirements. (We hope this will alleviate a bottleneck in statistics courses in the future.) We are in initial stages to plan a “math boot camp” to help students prepare for and pass the Entry Level Math tutorial to gain access into MATH 117.
- Recruiting students for membership in Psi Chi, PSA (Psychology Student Alliance), SLS (Students as Leaders in Science) and SACNAS (Society for Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science).
- Partnering with Judy Brobst, Career Counselor for the College of Natural Sciences, to connect our students to career/graduate school resources earlier in the college experience.

Dr. Lucy Troup who has been on the Research Advisory Board for ISTeC for nearly three years, was invited to be Co-Chair of this committee and to sit on the ISTeC Executive committee. Dr. Troup was also invited to attend and represent CSU at the CSIA (Colorado Software and Internet Society) award ceremony in Denver, June 5th 2007. Specifically to support the launch of the Vice president for Economic Development at CSU and the CSIA’s joint venture in developing 5 new scholarships for

undergraduates pursuing their studies in Information Science and Technology at CSU.

The total amount of funds raised in private support for the Department of Psychology in 2006-2007 was \$57,275. This total includes a \$29,917 from NARSAD in support of Dr. Deana Davalos' Brain Abnormalities research, a \$6,400 gift to Psi Chi, and the remainder is made up of donations from alumni.

The Colorado Injury Control Research Center (Director, Lorann Stallones) received another 5 years of funding from the CDC/NCIPC (\$884,841 per year). CICRC's purpose is to participate with communities to reduce injuries, primarily in Public Health Service Region VIII, with a focus on under-served populations including Native Americans, Hispanics and rural residents. The CICRC has been continuously funded since 1995. The review stated: "This center has a demonstrated track record for directed research and training in injury control. The center demonstrates a profound education and dissemination mission, and the center has proven to be successful in these areas. The center has extensive partnerships with the University of Colorado School of Medicine, Craig Rehabilitation Hospital, and the Colorado Department of Public Health and the Environment. Community partnerships are strongly evident, clearly supportive, and operational." Participants include Dr. Carolyn DiGiuseppi from UCDHSC's Department of Preventive Medicine and Biometrics, and CSU's Dr. Pat Sample and Julie Gibbs-Long.

Dr. Peter Chen along with faculty members in the Department of Environmental Health here at CSU and four other universities were recently awarded a major training grant through NIOSH (\$1,147,000, annually) to establish the Mountains and Plains Education and Research Center (MAP ERC). MAP ERC is one of only 17 ERC's in the country. One of the main objectives of the ERC is inter-institutional collaboration. Students and faculty from CSU, University of Colorado-Denver, National Jewish Hospital, Denver Health, and the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center will work closely together to advance research and practice in occupational health and safety. The center will expand the current training programs in occupational medicine, industrial hygiene, ergonomics, and health physics. One of the most exciting opportunities through the ERC is the further development of the training program here at CSU in occupational health psychology. Finally, the center will provide various activities including continuing education opportunities, community outreach, and pilot research grants. Funding for this program begins this fall and the psychology department will continue to develop its graduate training in occupational health psychology (OHP). Currently there are five psychology graduate students in Applied Social

and IO funded by the OHP Training Program Grant (TPG) including Taylor Moore, Julie Maertens, Monica Rosales, Paige Gardner, and Julie Sampson. One of the goals of this program is to train students across a wide variety of occupational health and safety fields, including psychology, ergonomics and industrial hygiene. Furthermore, the students are encouraged to work on collaborative interdisciplinary projects with students and faculty in other occupational safety and health areas. All the OHP students and faculty are working closely together to ensure that this new program is a success.

Dr. Deana Davalos is Co-Principle Investigator on a grant awarded by the United States Department of Agriculture, entitled: *Relationship between Infant Growth and Neurocognitive Development and Maternal Dietary intake of Omega 3 Docosahexaenoic Acid*. (3 years, \$499, 914)

Dr. Dick Suinn, emeritus faculty member, was a panelist on an APA convention symposium with past APA presidents, "Humanizing an Inhumane World," a panelist on the APA convention symposium, "Commission on Ethnic Minority Recruitment, Retention and Training 2," conducted an interview of Albert Bandura, at the APA convention plenary session, "Albert Bandura: Up Close and Personal," and is a member of the APA Central Program Working Group, which designs and implements the speakers for the APA convention's Plenary Sessions

Dr. George Thornton will be on leave fall semester to extend his international research and other professional activities. In September he will spend two weeks in Singapore where he will collaborate with colleagues on research on culture competency using simulation technology. Later in September he will present a workshop on assessment centers in Costa Rica and study how ACs are being run in Latin America. In October he will go to South Korea to gather data for his study of cross cultural comparisons of achievement motivation. He will travel on to India where he will gather additional data on achievement motivation and teach a 5-week course on consulting practices at Xavier University School of Industrial Relations. In between these international trips, George will spend a couple days in Washington DC to continue his service on the technical advisory panel to the National Assessment of Educational Progress designing research to validate the 12th grade tests as predictors of preparedness for work, and a couple days in Canada training HR folks in the Canadian Military Forces how to design and implement assessment centers.

Dr. Carol Seger received funding from the National Institute of Mental Health. The grant is entitled, "Corticostriatal networks in human categorization" and is funded for five years for a total of \$1,112, 500. Dr. Seger plans to use this grant to fund functional magnetic resonance

imaging studies of human cognition, focusing on the contributions of the basal ganglia to human learning and behavior. Basal ganglia dysfunction is associated with many common psychiatric and neurological disorders, including Parkinson's disease, obsessive-compulsive disorder, attention deficit - hyperactivity disorder, and addiction.

Dr. Anne Cleary served as the Program Chair for Division 3 of APA (Experimental Psychology), and put together the program for this August's convention in San Francisco. The program had the interdisciplinary theme: Uniting Psychology Through Memory. Some of the highlights from this program were the following. 1) A symposium linking research on learning & memory with educational practices that had a novel format: It began with opening talks from two prominent researchers in the field (Drs. Elizabeth and Robert Bjork) followed by an invited poster session with presentations from prominent laboratories from all around the country. 2) A poster session in which an award was given for the best poster first-authored by a graduate student. The runner-up for this award was Colorado State's Marc Richard, who received 2nd place. 3) Several invited addresses by prominent researchers took place and were well-attended.

The past summer marked the completion of the 2nd Annual Summer Program on Mind and Brain, a research program for undergraduates supported by the National Science Foundation and Department of Defense under the REU (Research Experiences for Undergraduates) and ASSURE (Awards to Stimulate and Support Undergraduate Research Experiences) award mechanisms, respectively. Twelve students participated in the program, with nine from primarily undergraduate institutions and five from ethnic minority groups that are underrepresented in psychology. The participants stayed on campus for nine weeks and completed a research project from start to finish. They also completed a four-week course on mind and brain, participated in a weekly seminar series, participated in weekly workshops, and went on a site visit to the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center. The capstone event was a symposium and banquet in which students presented posters on the research they conducted during the program, and keynote addresses were given by Betty Glisky of the University of Arizona and Tim Curran of the University of Colorado. Marlen Gonzalez from Manhattanville College received the Best Poster Award for her poster entitled "Color Heterogeneity and Visual Search" and Lorraine Siebold from Andrews University received the Best Program Participant Award.
