Request to Drop Concentration in Ethnic Studies

A request by the College of Liberal Arts to drop the concentration in Ethnic Studies under the major in Liberal Arts (B.A. degree program) was approved. The effective date, subject to approval by Faculty Council, is Fall Semester 2011.

Request to Drop Minimum Grade Requirement for the Concentration in Social Studies Teaching

A request by the Department of History to drop the minimum grade requirement of B for SPCM 200 Public Speaking in the Social Studies Teaching concentration within the History major was approved. The recommended effective date, subject to special action by Faculty Council, is Fall 2009.

Request to Add Conservation Leadership Specialization in Human Dimensions of Natural Resources

A request by the Department of Forest Rangeland Watershed Stewardship to add a specialization in conservation leadership to the M.S. program in human dimensions of natural resources was approved. The committee supports the specialization with the chance to assess and evaluate it before submitting the program as a stand-alone degree. The recommended effective date, subject to approval by Faculty Council, is Spring Semester 2010.

Consideration of CSU-Global Academic Programs

The University Curriculum Committee considered the following credit bearing courses to have comparable academic requirements and standards to those offered at CSU-FC and approved them for one time offerings this fall:

- FIN 500 Principles of Finance
- MGT 505 Market Planning
- MGT 510 Strategy Planning
- MGT 535 Communication Skills for Leaders
- ORG 505 Organizational Change
- ORG 545 Diversity in Leadership (It is noted that the CSU-FC course VE 767 was not the currently

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approved version of EDOD 767)
ORG 550 Decision Making and Leadership

OTL 570 was not assured as comparable to courses offered at CSU because it listed contact hours for the 8 modules as a total of 8-40, which is insufficient. In addition, there are inconsistencies in its objectives, learning outcomes, and topics which are unclear as to level (or options as to level) of programs being addressed, and the program and course linkage.
